Around Hollywood Film Lots

HOLLYWOOD (U.P.)—Facts and figures on "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs," the Walt Disney extravaganza which is being withdrawn from circulation at the close of this month:

It cost \$1,700,000 to make. Five hundred and seventy artists made 200,000 separate drawings, but counting experimental drawings, the total number of sketches was nearer 1,600,000.

It broke records in the first run theatres of every large city it played. At the Plaza theatre in Sydney, Australia, it played 21 weeks, at the El Dorado in Brussels 10 weeks, at the Alfa theatre in Prague 13 weeks, at the Marignol theatre in Paris 31 weeks, at the New Gallery theatre in London 35 weeks, at the Sage in Stockholm 16 weeks, and at the Noggroth in Amsterdam 19 weeks.

The book version, Disney edition, of "Snow White" sold at the rate of 50,000 copies a day, reaching a total sale figure of 22,000,000.

One hundred and forty-seven manufacturers were licensed to

manufacture 2,138 individual products which ranged from dolls to foundation garments. There were 16,500,000 "Snow White" drinking glasses sold, and more than 2,000,000 dolls.

Dopey got more fan mail than all the other characters combined. "Snow White" was the first sound picture to be translated into a "talking book" for the blind.

The picture played in 41 countries. It has been recorded in 10 languages and each version had a different "Snow White" and different dwarfs. In fact, none of the speaking characters in the picture appeared in any two versions.

It will gross \$8,000,000 on its first play off, which means on its first round of the world. In the United States and Canada "Snow White" was permitted to play single features only. In other words, there were no bank nights, no give-aways, nor any other artificial stimulants to exploit the film.

Original drawings were exhibited in art galleries throughout the world. Lord Duven, famous British collector, purchased sets. The producer of "Snow White" received honorary degrees from Harvard, Yale and the University of Southern California.
