

William Porter Succumbs June 2 in Far-Off India

Word was received this week by Mrs. Caroline Williams of 1012 Cedar street, that her son, William Porter, succumbed to a sun stroke in Jamshepur, India, last Friday, June 2. Mr. Porter, who was 54, had been in India with his wife, Millie, for the past three years and had recently signed another three-year contract with the Tata Iron and Steel company, a British firm.

Funeral service was held in Jamshepur which is 450 miles from Calcutta, and Mrs. Porter and their son, William, are now enroute to the United States with the ashes.
