**Jitterbugs 'Swing It' for Idol Artie Shaw**



Rhythm rules the town in Los Angeles next Sunday, June 18, when Artie Shaw and his orchestra present a gigantic swing concert plus the 1939 National Jitterbug Championship and International Jitterbug Contest, at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum. Climaxing the first annual National Jitterbug Convention, June 16 to 18 in Los Angeles, will be the gigantic Artie Shaw Swing Concert and International Jitterbug Championship Contests at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum Sunday, June 18, at 1:30 p.m., according to announcement by chairman Roy Lester, defending Los Angeles jitterbug champion.  
Thousands of young jitterbugs will compete on the world's largest outdoor dance floor, with \$250,000 in cash prizes to be awarded to winners. Two separate contests will be staged, the 1939 National Jitterbug Championship, and the International Jitterbug Contest. In the latter event, representatives of all nations will compete.  
A crowd of more than 80,000 is expected to attend the Coliseum event. Contests are open to all nationalities. Tickets are on sale at the Palomar in Los Angeles, and at all ticket agencies.


