WILLIAM McELHANEY . . .
Funeral services for William McElhane, who died July 4 at a Los Angeles hospital, were held July 8 at the Stone & Myers' mortuary with Rev. F. D. Porter officiating. Interment followed in Inglewood Park Cemetery. Mr. McElhane, 83 years of age, lived at 1101 West 188th street, Gardena. He was a native of Pennsylvania and had lived the last 40 years in California of which the last 17 years were spent in Gardena.
