

Deed for Elena Street Accepted at City Session

By accepting the deed of easement to portions of lots in the Hollywood Riviera district from the Huntington Land company, the city council paved the way Tuesday night for the extension and improvement of Elena avenue by the county. The city of Redondo Beach is leading in the move for this work and in submitting the deed, Redondo officials stated that its acceptance will bring both cities' proceedings in behalf of Elena to completion. All that remains now is apportionment of county funds for the improvement.

Other council matters transacted this week were: Receipt of a check for \$50.61 from the Union Oil company for gross earnings under a city franchise and a request from the Four-square Gospel church to zone a lot on Madrid avenue near Carson street to permit erection of a new church. The pastor of the church, Rev. W. E. Nicholls, stated that he found it was impossible to locate the owner of a lot on 220th street near Cabrillo which had first been considered.

Hear Fire Zone Law

William H. Stanger, manager of the municipal water district, has offered to sell the church the Madrid avenue lots owned by the water district, Rev. Nicholls said. Councilman Tom McGuire, head of the city planning commission, stated that the area already permits churches but the council held up the matter for further study because no price had been mentioned for the property.

City Engineer Leonard Young submitted a revised fire zone ordinance, which he said had been approved after revisions by the Board of Fire Underwriters of the Pacific. This ordinance, which was adopted Tuesday night, reduces the area of Fire Zone No. 1 to the immediate business district, creates a "buffer" area around that district for Zone No. 2 and the remainder of the city is placed in the third zone.

Vote Appropriations

A request by Fire Chief J. E. McMaster for installation of three fire hydrants at the corner of Dominguez and Sartori, the corner of the alley and Beech between Torrance boulevard and Eldorado, and the corner of the alley and Acacia between the boulevard and Eldorado, was referred to the water department for a recommendation.

The sum of \$50,000 was ordered transferred from the water department fund to the city's general fund. Expenditures totalling \$660 were approved. They were: \$225 for a Ross valve for the fire department; \$385 for installation of three windshields on fire trucks and \$50 for Fire Chief McMaster's expenses in attending the annual convention of Pacific Coast Fire Chiefs at San Francisco.

Because the figures submitted by Manager Stanger of the water department for the purchase of a new adding machine did not appear to be correct, the council referred his request back to Stanger for revision.
