"There is that maketh himself rich, yet hath nothing; there is that maketh himself poor, yet hath great riches." This verse from Proverbs is the Golden Text in the Lesson-Sermon on "Unreality" on Sunday in all Churches of Christ, Scientist.

One of the Scriptural selections in the Lesson-Sermon includes these passages from James: "From whence come wars and fightings among you? come they not hence, even of your lusts that war in your members? . . . ye fight and war, yet ye have not, because ye ask not. Ye ask, and receive not, because ye ask amiss, that ye may consume it upon your lusts. . . . Draw nigh to God, and he will draw nigh to you. . . . Stumble yourselves in the sight of the Lord, and he shall lift you up." This verse from Colossians is also presented: "Set your affection on things above, not on things on the earth."

The Lesson-Sermon includes also these statements from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "Hold thought steadfastly to the enduring, the good, and the true, and you will bring these into your experience proportionally to their occupancy of your thoughts. . . . Good demands of man every hour, in which to work out the problem of being. Consecration to good does not lessen man's dependence on God, but heightens it."
