My Neighbor says:

Chocolate used in cooked or uncooked frosting should be cooled after it is melted. Otherwise it may cause the frosting to become too thin.

Broken pecans or sliced Brazil nuts in maple syrup make a delicious sauce for frozen, baked or steamed puddings. Use one-third of a cup of nuts to each cup of sirup. Boil the two together for three minutes and serve hot.

In baking fruit or wedding cakes which require long, slow cooking, place a shallow pan filled with water in the oven. The water will help keep the cakes moist and give a glaze to their surfaces. Each cake should be allowed to cool in the pan in which it was baked.

Bolled frosting often becomes grainy because of overcooking or stirring while cooking. Add 1 teaspoon of vinegar for each cup of sugar and cook the mixture only until a fine thread forms when a portion is poured from a spoon.

Try dipping fish filets in yellow cornmeal, in milk and again in cornmeal. Then fry them in deep fat until they are well-browned.

Stuff tomatoes with cottage cheese mixed with diced pineapple. The result is a tasty combination. (Released by The Associated Newspapers)
