

Gauchos Look Like Champs in Crushing Tartars 19 to 0

SAN PEDRO INVADES FIELD HERE FRIDAY

Those cautious souls who are willing to wager a fin or two that the grim reaper and taxes will arrive to every man can now stake their odd pennies on another safe bet: Narbonne to be champions of the Marine league in varsity football.

The Gauchos from down Lomita way demonstrated last Friday afternoon that they are a title-bound outfit when they crushed the Torrance Tartars 19 to 0 before a crowd estimated at 2,500.

The local eleven was no match for Coach Bill Sloan's polished machine which rolled up a total of 238 yards in scrimmage and made 17 first downs while the Tartars were allowed but 13 yards and one first down—and that made possible because of a penalty.

Game Starts at 2:30
Tomorrow afternoon a sadder and wiser Torrance squad will tangle with San Pedro's Pirates, starting at 2:30 o'clock, and there is a bare possibility that the Tartars may sink the invaders from the port city. Even the most disheartened local fan still believes Coach Bob Barr will pull one victory out of the season—and it may be Friday. Narbonne, with two straight wins, draws a bye date this weekend. The Gauchos play Gardena at Lomita Nov. 10.

Barr had no alibis to offer for the Tartars' inept performance last Friday. He simply said that the Narbonners are a much better team with more speed and fight than his boys developed. By no means has the locals' morale been wrecked by the pounding of the Gauchos' flying feet and the team came thru the game in excellent condition physically.

Narbonne revealed its power before the game was two minutes old. Harry Hagedorn started the scoring by returning a punt 25 yards for a touchdown. Two minutes later, one of 75 yards and the other for 50, also netted scores. Milo Roberts went over from the 5-yard stripe on one in the second quarter and John Walker tallied from the 2-yard marker on the other in the third period. Binkley converted Hagedorn's touchdown.

Shimatsu Strong Man
That was the scoring of the day. But the Gauchos had opportunities to make others. However, the Tartars buckled down to business a couple of times to stave off further loss.

Akige Shimatsu was the strong man of the Torrance team. He was in almost every play and when the honors are portioned out by All-Marine pickers he deserves at least honorable mention. Kenny Perkin averaged nearly 24 yards on his punts—and he had to keep kicking them all afternoon to hold back the galloping Gauchos. Lineups:


