

Questions and Answers

Q. Will the warrants be acceptable as payment for food and clothing, for F.H.A. loans and rent, for gas and lights, doctor bills, etc.—the same as legal United States money?

A. No. All reputable California business has warned that warrants will not be acceptable for any purpose whatever, because under existing State and Federal laws no State or National bank can exchange cash for warrants or receive them in place of money. Also, because wholesalers and manufacturers, Statewide and Nationally, from whom merchants buy their goods have served notice that they CANNOT AND WILL NOT accept warrants; and because, California law requires that payment for clerk hire and all other labor must be made in cash or in negotiable instruments and payable in cash on demand.

Q. As a prospective home owner, will I be able to get a home loan thru the new Bank the Act will set up?

A. No. The Act makes no provision for home loans, and F.H.A. won't take warrants.

Q. How does the Act provide for the widely promised exchange of a dollar in real money for a pension warrant only 30 days old—carrying only 10c in "redemption stamps"?

A. It doesn't. There is no basis whatever for the promise. The Act says, in Sec. 14, Par. 1, that the warrants "shall be redeemed at face value with lawful money of the United States—PROVIDED THEY ARE FULLY STAMPED—AND ARE PRESENTED FOR REDEMPTION NO SOONER THAN 53 WEEKS AND NOT LATER THAN 57 WEEKS AFTER ISSUE."

Q. As a pensioner, what effect will the Act have on my present pension money?

A. Regardless of what you may be told, your pension will stop entirely if "Ham and Eggs" plan is adopted, as pension recipients already have been warned by the State Department of Social Welfare. The reason is clear: There will be no money in public funds to pay them,—only warrants. And while the federal government matches our pension payments to the aged in legal money,—IT WILL NOT MATCH WARRANTS.

Q. As a WPA worker, will the Act affect me, or my brother on PWA?

A. It will cost you your job, for the same reason as above, there will be no State money to match Federal funds.

Q. Are there any further taxes necessitated by the Act?

A. Sec. 15, Par. 2 provides a new 3 percent gross transactions tax on every loaf of bread, pound of butter, and all other things you buy. Sec. 15, Par. 1 promises a return of the Sales Tax on food, in ADDITION to the new 3 percent tax—and a further ultimatum would prevent the legislature from ever exempting foods again.

Furthermore, the Federal Social Security Bureau, thru its Chairman, Arthur J. Altmeyer, reports: "The program would cost every employed worker in California an average of \$625 per year!" President Roosevelt just recently said, "The 30-Thursday plan would result in a 25 PERCENT TAX ON ALL CALIFORNIA INCOMES.—FALLING FAR MORE HEAVILY ON THE POOR THAN ON THE RICH!"

Q. What about Labor's contention that the Act would outlaw all strikes and picketing and lose all labor's gains for the past 25 years?

A. In plain English, the Act provides, in Sec. 2, Par. 3, that "NO CAPACITY TO PRODUCE GOODS, SERVICES, CONVENIENCES OR COMFORTS SHALL BE CURTAILED, LIMITED OR RENDERED NON-PRODUCTIVE BY ANY MEANS WHATSOEVER."

Q. What basis is there for all the talk of "dictatorship" in connection with "Ham and Eggs"?

A. The Act proposes to confer more autocratic power on its "Administrator" than ever has been granted any man in all American history. Even Hitler and Mussolini would be envious.

1. The promoters, Roy G. Owens and Will H. Kindig, both of Los Angeles, have reached a new high in self-seeking arrogance by WRITING THEIR OWN NAMES INTO THE BILL, as the only two men out of California's 7 million citizens who may be named "Administrator" Sec. 4.

2. Either Owens or Kindig will control every cent of public money in California—though neither has had one day's experience of any kind to fit him for the tremendously important job they are high-pressuring the aged into creating for them. Sec. 26.

3. Either Owens or Kindig will appoint as many staff members as he likes, name their terms of office and their salaries, order raises when he chooses and add to their number when he feels like it, without restriction—creating the greatest political machine California has ever known. Sec. 30. Not even the Huey Long machine, which scuttled the Louisiana Ship of State with such high-handed arrogance, could compare with this insolent abuse of government.

4. Either Owens or Kindig, as "Administrator," may disregard the Courts—the Law—the Governor—the Legislature—the People. Sec. 37 provides that "NO LEGAL OR EQUITABLE PROCESS SHALL EVER INTERFERE" with their administration of the Act.

Either Owens or Kindig, as "Administrator," may call elections at will. Sec. 36.

And if the people remove the "Administrator" from office—HE RETAINS THE PRIVILEGE OF NAMING HIS OWN SUCCESSOR! Sec. 39.
