My Neighbor says:

In cooking anything with cheese, use a low temperature because intense heat makes cheese tough and stringy. When washing dishes used for either raw or cooked fish, about two heaping teaspoonsful of baking soda added to the dish water will deodorize the dishes, dish water and dish cloth.

Writing ink can be removed by using table salt and lemon juice. Cover the spot with salt and squeeze on the lemon juice. Repeat until all the stain is removed. Then rinse in clear water and wash as usual.

You can put your house plants in the proper soil. You can give them the right amount of air and moisture but unless they have enough light they won't thrive.

Dip thin slices of sweet pickles in mayonnaise. Then place the pickles on crackers or toast spread with fish paste.

If your clothing has become too blue from bluing wash it well in plenty of hot water and soap suds. If it is still too blue soak it in three quarts of hot water to which three tablepoonsful of vinegar have been added.


