

Tartars Adopt 'Razzle-Dazzle' for Final Game Tomorrow at Gardena

Intricate Plays and Aerial Attack May Bring Victory

Scrapping his previous grid strategies in favor of an out and out "razzle-dazzle" style of play, Coach Bob Barr this week switched his Torrance Tartars from an ineffectual ground force into a team that will depend on intricate hidden ball maneuvers and a bold passing attack to win the first local victory of the expiring season.

The Tartars travel to Gardena tomorrow afternoon to take on the Mohicans in the final game of the Marine League series. The kickoff is at 2:30 o'clock.

Beaten by Banning 12 to 7, by Narbonne 19 to 0 and by San Pedro 32 to 0, the Tartars are overdue in realizing the potentialities they had at the start of the gridiron campaign. Gardena was defeated by San Pedro 12 to 0, won over Banning 13 to 0 and held the Narbonne Gauchos to a 6 to 6 tie last Friday.

Thus, on the record books, it looks like the Torrance varsity is due to end its 1939 season without a tally in the win column. But Coach Barr has been putting his outfit thru some intensive drills during the past eight days and by adopting the "razzle-dazzle" he may pull a victory out of Gardena come sundown tomorrow.

During scrimmage Tuesday and yesterday, he was using Eugene Hatter at the right half spot and big Robert Ernest was hoisting his 225 pounds around in Ner Rathbun's place at tackle. These were the only changes in the lineup and Barr said that they might not be in effect when the whistle blows for the Gardena encounter.

A win for the Tartars would only take the sour taste out of the mouths of local supporters because it would not affect the Marine League standings so far as the Torrance school is concerned.

The Tartars are certain holders of cellar position. Last year they were champions. But that is football.

Fish and Game Law Breakers Penalized


Vigilance of federal, state and local enforcement officers resulted in the arrest and conviction of 397 persons for violations of the California Fish and Game Code in September.
