

Chamber Urges Four Civic Betterments

On recommendation of the community service committee, headed by H. T. Lintott, Torrance Chamber of Commerce directors endorsed the following civic improvements and recommended to the city council that appropriate action be taken to put them into effect:

- 1. Placing of a reasonable number of wooden benches in all city parks and squares, including El Prado parkway;
2. Installation of a reasonable number of drinking fountains and rubbish cans in city parks and El Prado parkway for the convenience of those wishing to use these spots for picnics and lunches;
3. Equipping of additional playgrounds in the western part of the city for the convenience of children living too far from the municipal park;
4. Requesting the City Council to instruct the police department to enforce the "quiet zone" around the Torrance Memorial hospital.

Chairman Lintott stated that these recommendations had been made following liberal discussion by members of the community service committee, which included, besides himself, Rev. F. Joseph V. Fitzgerald, Rev. Harry G. Banks, Mrs. Flora Wright and Lyle Doan. Chamber directors also addressed a communication to the council requesting immediate contact with the Los Angeles Board of Education in an effort to have the school playgrounds kept open during the mid-summer vacation period. Similar requests in previous years made by Mayor Tolson even as early as April have been met with the explanation that the "requests came too late." Last year the L. A. Board of Education provided supervision for a large number of school playgrounds during the summer, but refused to allow children to use Torrance school playgrounds because no arrangements had been made for adult supervision.

Mail Rush Being Efficiently Met

"Torrance is a generous river. It gives more than it receives." Postmaster Earl Conner is the authority for that statement and he should know: Hasn't he kept a sharp eye on all outgoing and incoming Christmas mail here since 1934?

Monday afternoon he watched his fellow-workers line up 114 jam-packed sacks of mail in preparation for shipment to all points in the U. S. and Canada. There was no let up Sunday on the part of the hard working postal crew and they shipped out 14 sacks that day. On Saturday 102 sacks were dispatched from here.

"That certainly indicates that we're a bit better off than many parts of the country because our incoming mail has not been near as large," Conner declared.

Saturday the post-office will work all day, clearing incoming mail and sending out material received at the windows up to 6 p. m. The mail center will be closed Sunday and Christmas Day but all gift parcels will be delivered as fast as they are received on those two days.

All special delivery and special handling mail will also receive prompt attention even though the office is officially closed for the holidays.
