Council Gets Christmas Gift

City councilmen received a Christmas gift at their meeting Tuesday night. After resting on the city clerk's table throughout the brief business session, it was handed to Mayor William H. Tolson by Clerk A. H. Bartlett with the statement that "Santa Claus had left this with me for you fellows."

The grimly-decorated package was handled gingerly by the mayor and passed on to Councilman James Hitchcock who carefully stripped off the cellophane, ribbons and stickers. When it was finally denuded of Christmas wrappings, the gift stood revealed.

It was a toy fire truck and it bore this card: "Reconditioned 1897 model Max fire truck—CHEAP. See our agent Prewett." On the fire was written: "Made in 1890." Councilmen, the three reporters present and four men in the audience, including B. M. Prewett, who has taken an active part in criticizing the Moek pump truck purchased by the city last September (see photo on picture page), got a big laugh out of the council's Yuletide gift.

Prewett said he received a similar gift only his was labeled "Maek 1940" by the unknown giver.

Test Well May Open New Oil Field In City

(Continued from Page 1-A) cial producer), McDowell figures he was about 1,500 feet north of the oil structure. However, he contends that the information obtained from this well, plus other data secured from faults, cesspools and wells, all point to the fact that the "major Torrance oil field" lies in the area to be tested by the Dominguez Estates Fee No. 1.

The pioneer oil man, who has been in the business 30 years and has been gathering data locally for the past ten years, contends that there are four oil sands to be reached by the new test hole. These will be encountered at 3,500 feet, 4,300 to 4,500 feet, 5,700 feet, and 6,300 to 6,500 feet levels.

In the test made by McDowell in 1933 at 152nd and Crenshaw, he went down 7,200 feet. Good showings were also encountered by McDowell in 1930 when he drilled a well for the Ohio Oil Company north of 182nd street, near Crenshaw, or approximately 2,000 feet north of the McDowell Community well. The Ohio Oil well was bottomed at 7,418 feet.

To Prove His Belief While McDowell has no direct financial interest in the new Dominguez Estates test well, the decision of this large and wealthy land company to drill its 400-acre site in Torrance is said to be the result of a two and one-half year dogged fight by McDowell to prove his belief in the potentialities of this area.

Should his contentions materialize and another oil field be found in Torrance, it will be due largely to the long and untiring efforts of this pioneer oil operator.

Since the test well is being put down by a large land owner with ample cash resources, it will no doubt settle for once and for all the long standing argument about the potentialities of the land bordering Western avenue. If no oil be found, it will leave this valuable land open for other development, either residentially or industrially, civic leaders point out.

"U-Boat 29" Thrilling Drama of Espionage

The catastrophic now sweeping Europe is brought to vivid actuality on the screen of the Lomita theatre, where Columbia's "U-Boat 29" presents a stirring dramatic picture of a war-smitten England desperately battling enemy spies and submarines, starting tonight.

With Conrad Veidt, Valerie Hobson and Sebastian Shaw in the featured roles, and said to be based upon actual incidents in the last World War, "U-Boat 29" bears an amazing resemblance at times to recent events abroad. Particularly is this true in the case of the thrill-tense climax of the new film, in which a passenger vessel, laden with women and children, is torpedoed by an undersea craft.

For the most part, however, "U-Boat 29" confines itself to the bitter struggle between an enemy agent and the counter-espionage network. By thus confining the war to the efforts of individuals, director Michael Powell achieves an atmospheric taut with life-and-death conflict that his cameras automatically embrace in scope the worldwide disaster and its significance.


