Each New Year brings a fresh parade of anniversaries. Everyone has a birthday, many wedding dates are remembered (or forgotten), and the usual holidays recur. In 1940 these will be augmented by the centenaries of some great events.

The list is full of historic significance. It includes the 500th anniversary of the invention of printing, the 400th of the first printing in the New World at Mexico City, the 300th of the earliest book produced in Colonial America by the Stephen Daye Press, the 250th of the first paper mill in the United States, and the 150th of Benjamin Franklin's death.

Beside these milestones in the history of printing, 1940 will also be the 600th anniversary of Chaucer's birth, the centenary of the first postage stamp and (approximately) of the first practical photography.

There is enough variety to interest everybody. The typographical anniversaries are especially significant because printing has contributed more than any other one factor to the spread of knowledge and the progress of civilization.

Scholars and readers will renew their acquaintance with Chaucer's humane jollity, patriots will join printers in honoring Franklin's career, stamp collectors will dream of finding mint copies of the "penny black," and candid cameras will prove how far and fast the world has moved since Daguerre's experiments.

It looks like a busy year.
