First candidate to throw a hat in the National political ring from this district is Mrs. Clara N. Colden, who called at The Herald office this week and announced her intention of entering the race again as representative from this district to the House of Representatives at Washington. In a statement to The Herald, Mrs. Colden said: "I have been urged by many residents of the 17th Congressional district to state my position in regard to the coming elections. After a careful survey of conditions, both in Washington and in the district, I have decided to be a candidate for the Democratic nomination for Representative in Congress of this district at the August primaries."

Popular in Capitol Mrs. Colden is the widow of the late Congressman Charles J. Colden, and is well known in Washington as well as throughout the 17th district. Her popularity at the Capitol was shown by her election to the presidency of their organization by wives of Congressmen. Following the death of her husband, Mrs. Colden entered the race for the Democratic nomination as Representative in this district, but lost by a small margin of votes to Lee Geyer, who subsequently was elected.

A demonstration of the facts of Soul to Jesus" way resolves the dark visions of material sense into harmony and immortality. . . . We must hold forever the consciousness of existence, and sooner or later, through Christ and Christian Science, we must master sin and death."

EDWARD GEORGE ROTHLEDER . . . retired music instructor and for several seasons conductor of the Pittsburgh (Pa.) Symphony orchestra, passed away Monday evening at the Erwin hotel where he had lived for the past five years. He was 73 years of age, a native of Pittsburgh.

For many years, Professor Rothleder was recognized as one of Pittsburgh's finest music instructors. He had spent many years abroad in study. Having

suffered a nervous breakdown, he spent the latter years of his life in retirement but he was still able to appreciate and enjoy the great symphonies.

His kindly, patient manner through his years of suffering endeared him to those nearest him. Professor Rothleder was survived by three sisters, Mrs. Matilda Winters of this city, Miss Rose Rothleder and Mrs. F. C. Murdock, Forest Hills, N. Y.; a brother, Carl Rothleder with whom he made his home here, and two nephews, Kermit Murdock of Forest Hills and John R. Winters of this city.
