Funeral services for William Joseph Howell, 74, assistant postmaster of Torrance from 1923 to 1935, died Monday of heart disease at his home, 2444 East Palmes avenue, Glendale, where he had lived for the past few months, were conducted this afternoon in the Wood Kirk of the Heather, Forest Lawn Memorial Park. A native of England, Howell came to this country 52 years ago. He entered the United States Postal Service in 1898, and in 1917 joined the overseas postal service in France. He leaves his widow, Mrs. Elizabeth H. Howell; two daughters, Mrs. Elizabeth Day of Miles City, Mont. and Mrs. Edith M. Butt of Glendale; and four sons, William J. Howell, Jr. of Miles City, Gordon E. Howell of Chicago, Sidney H. Howell of Glendale and Cecil J. Howell of Los Angeles.
