My Neighbor Says:

Handle chiffon carefully during laundering. Squeeze it gently after it has been rinsed in warm water and mild soap suds. Never twist or wring the fabric. Shape it out and press it on the wrong side when it is nearly dry. Use a moderately warm iron, never a hot one.

Thoroughly mash or rice potatoes to be used in cake or roll recipes. If leftover potatoes are to be used be sure they are not highly seasoned. Soften them by heating in a double boiler and pressing through a sieve.

Keep cream that is to be whipped very cold. And chill the bowl and beater to be used in whipping it. If the cream is slow to thicken add a little salt or lemon juice to hasten the process.

William King Dies In Hospital

Coming as a shock to family and friends was the sudden death of William King at the Hermosa hospital Sunday morning.

On Tuesday morning while putting his car in the garage, Mr. King slipped and fell against the bumper of the car, fracturing three ribs on his right side. While the injury was painful it was not considered serious. On Wednesday night he entered the hospital for X-rays and treatment and was advised to stay for a few days. Sunday morning he felt better and wanted to come home and shortly after chatting with his doctor, collapsed with a heart attack, passing away almost immediately.

In 1912 Mr. King had one of those now-fangled businesses, a garage on Redondo-Wilmington Road and for several years was engaged in business there. For many years up to the time of his death he was an engineer of the Los Angeles Soap Company where he was held in high esteem.

Had Hosts of Friends
In 1918 he married Mrs. Bertha Blaine and for 22 years they have made their home at 26000 Cypress street. A loyal friend and kind neighbor he made hosts of friends in the nearly 30 years he lived in Lomita to which the chapel filled with friends and flowers bore witness yesterday.

Services were held Wednesday afternoon at the A. M. Gamby Mortuary with Rev. E. E. Clark of Eagle Rock officiating. Mrs. E. L. Gibson sang several numbers and interment was at Roosevelt Memorial Park.

More Ways to Tax Sought by Co. Officials

An inkling of the lengths to which Los Angeles County officials are going in their endeavor to increase county revenues by finding additional tax sources became known at the Hall of Records today in a request for a legal opinion on taxing certain businesses.

The request was filed by County Manager Wayne Allen's department and listed a score or more of businesses on which it is contemplated placing license taxes if it be shown that the cost of inspection or services is sufficient to justify the license.

The businesses enumerated in the list are such as to be widespread and likely to be found in any community of the county. The legal opinion sought is whether the county can tax these businesses if they are already taxed and licensed by the state or if the county can add regulations to those of the state to justify the tax.

List of Sources
Recently the Board of Supervisors voted to create a committee of laymen to study the possibilities of finding additional sources of revenue for the county other than the tax on property and the various license fees which the county now has in effect.

Included in the list of businesses that county officials are studying with a possible view of taxing are: boarding houses, rooming houses, hotels, apartment houses, ice plants, live poultry dealers, mortuaries, milk dealers, scavengers, auto camps, bottling works, food manufacturers, livery stables, manufacturing and renovating plants, pet shops, rendering plants, fertilizer dealers, public dumps, swim pools, private schools, advertising electric signs, auto parking lots, locksmiths, autos for hire, ammunition and gun dealers, collection agencies, driving ranges and house moving businesses.

KIDDIES' KITCHEN

We've had so many requests from our little juniors asking for some recipe on how to prepare soup that we almost think Torrance, Lomita and Welteria are just bulging with kiddies who know what's good for them in this brim! chilly weather. So, here's one that a little different, juniorettes, and I do hope you like it.

Peanut Butter Soup
Put a quart of water in the lower part of a double boiler. Bring the water to a boil. Then, put four heaping teaspoonfuls of peanut butter into the upper part. Usually measurements are given level. But, as peanut butter is thick and clumsy, you will find heaping spoonful the easiest to manage.

Add one-half cup of milk and cook ten minutes. Then beat until creamy. Now, add another one-half cup of milk and cook five minutes longer. Beat the whole thing until smooth. Last of all, add one tablespoonful of butter and one level teaspoonful of salt. Add one more cup of milk and cook until smooth. Adding the milk gradually keeps the peanut butter from getting lumpy. But you must be sure your mixture is smooth and creamy each time you add more milk.
