(Continued from Page 1-A) There are two more hearings of importance to the local transportation situation. On March 15 the city of Torrance will present its request for permission to continue operating its buses over Los Angeles city streets to the Los Angeles Board of Public Utilities and Transportation. The continuation of the hearing of the Asbury Rapid Transit System's request of the State Railroad Commission for an interim and unrestricted permit to provide bus service between WALTERIA, LOMITA, TORRANCE and Los Angeles is scheduled for March 21.

The city of Torrance is renting Asbury buses for its municipal service under a contract which may be broken on a day's notice. The municipal buses, according to the last report, are netting a loss to the city of between \$10 and \$12 a day, a deficit which is considerably less than anticipated.
