FIRE CHIEF NEARING 15TH ANNIVERSARY AS FIREMAN

A 15th marital anniversary means gifts of crystal... but a 15th anniversary to a fireman means just another day.

Nevertheless, Fire Chief John Edward McMaster will receive congratulations on attaining that milestone with the department next Saturday, May 4, from his seven regular and 14 volunteer firemen.

He joined the department as a fireman in 1925. On July 11, 1931 he was appointed engineer, on December 1, 1934 he was advanced to captain, on Jan. 1, 1939 he became acting chief and on Nov. 1, 1939 he was given top ranking as chief.

McMaster has seen the department grow from one paid member to the present staff of from a single station house to three. A native of Nova Scotia, Canada, where he was born June 26, 1886, "Mac" was brought to the U.S. when he was only six years old. He lived in Pennsylvania for 15 years and came to Torrance from New York state in 1919.

The Torrance fire chief is a member of the California State Firemen's Association and is constantly studying the latest methods of fire prevention and fire-fighting. With his wife, Grace, he lives at 916 Cota avenue. They have three children, Ruth and John E. Jr., who live in Los Angeles, and Mrs. Helen Lilyard of San Diego.

Gardena Valley Dairies Score High In Test

The March report of the Los Angeles County Farm Bureau contesting association lists 13 cows from five dairies in the Gardena Valley that were on the Honor Roll for that month. For a cow to be placed on the Honor Roll, a production of 27 pounds or more of butterfat is required on the testing day.

"To persons not familiar with dairying, the figure 27 is not very significant unless it can be visualized in another way," stated M. J. Wolfe, assistant farm adviser in Los Angeles County, in discussing these high producing cows. "For example, if this fat can be converted into quarts or gallons of milk, most people can better appreciate it. If a cow produces milk that tests, say, 4% butterfat and produces 27 pounds of fat in a day, that would amount to 67 1/2 pounds of milk or, in terms of liquid measure, 31 1/2 quarts of milk per day."

Cobb, Head of Garner Campaign Raps Ickes, Olson

With the presidential primary less than a week away, the battle for Democratic delegates has apparently narrowed down to two contestants, it was pointed out today by Zach Lamar Cobb, co-chairman of the Garner slate.

"The voters now realize," Cobb said, "that Harold Ickes and Governor Olson are the heads of the slate which bears the president's name. I am certain that Olson and Ickes won't be given a blank check by the voters, which these two will use at the national convention to better their personal political advantages."

"The presidency of the United States is too high and too important an office to be used by anyone in a political horse trade, particularly for a horse which Ickes and Olson will keep themselves. Unbiased political observers all over the state concede that the Garner drive has increased a hundred fold the last few days and when the votes are tallied, the Ickes-Olson slate will be relegated to the junk pile," the fiery Cobb concluded.

"Palos Verdes, which recently 'grew' into a city of the sixth class, has another growing pain and now needs additional public school facilities.
