L. A. POPULATION NEARLY 1,500,000

Retaining its position as the fifth city in the nation, Los Angeles city population is given as 1,496,792, a gain of 258,734 in the decade.

Glendale became Los Angeles county's third largest city in population on the basis of a semi-final census report this week. The new Glendale count is 82,425, a gain of 19,689 over the 1930 figure of 62,736. Long Beach is the second largest city and Pasadena now takes fourth place. City Valuation Shows Increase

districts knew their tax base figure because their district boundaries are the same as city boundary lines.

Valuation on all land in the county was cut \$60,762,165 this year, and the value of all improvements was up by \$21,858,515, but there was an increase of \$18,818,450 in valuations on personal property.

"BABY CITY" IS NO INFANT IN VALUATION

The city of Palos Verdes Estates, "baby" among the county's 45 cities, is not by any means the smallest in point of total assessed valuation. County Assessor John R. Quinn pointed out today in connection with the new assessed valuation for all cities and the county as a whole.

Valuation of the new city that is subject to the general county tax levy is announced as \$2,294,715. Lowest is LaVerne, with a total book valuation of \$1,260,670. Glendora, its neighbor, is next with \$1,553,200.

The next seven in order, are Covina, Azusa, Gardena, El Monte, West Covina, Hawthorne and Avalon, the latter city being exceeded in valuation by the "baby" city by only \$200 even.
