Harbor District C. of C. After Increase In Highway Allocations

During the next few weeks the Harbor District Chambers of Commerce committeemen will concentrate effort to get bigger allocations of gasoline tax funds for Harbor District highways during the 1941-43 biennium, and to get Laguna Dominguez project developed as a Federal National Defense measure.

Meeting in regular session at Potrero Country Club, Inglewood, the highway committee of the Harbor booster group protested proposed highway expenditures as recommended by the County Regional Planning Commission to the Board of Supervisors and unanimously adopted a resolution requesting the Supervisors to return the recommendations to the Planning Commission for further study and see if an agreeable plan can be worked out to get more funds for highway improvement in the Harbor area. Particularly, Artesia Street opening and paving from Normandie Avenue to Main Street, and grading and paving Hawthorne Avenue from Century Boulevard to Imperial Highway and from the north city limits of Hawthorne to Redondo Beach Boulevard will get attention. Recommended expenditures for Artesia Street improvement, as made by the Planning Commission for the next biennium, is only \$100,000, an amount which the Harbor group feels is insufficient for the standpoint of project importance. Artesia Street is listed under Group "A" improvement projects studied by the Planning Commission, yet gets only \$100,000 in the recommendation, whereas other street projects including Rosemead Freeway, new Ridge Route and Angelus-Crest Highway are recommended to receive \$500,000 each.

Not only will effort be made to get bigger allocations for the highway project, but attempt will be centered on getting Hawthorne Avenue project changed to group "A" to receive special attention of the Board of Supervisors, County Road Department, Regional Planning Commission and State Highway Department, Oscar Willett, Palos Verdes President of the South-West District Highway Association, told the meeting.

Approval by the organization followed closely the official endorsement of Boro by the Committee of the Organized Labor Movement of Los Angeles and vicinity, Miller stated.

"Labor's endorsement came after a check of all candidates and was voted because of Boro's background as a longshoreman, fisherman and sales driver. In addition John Boro has served as an arbitrator and has settled many labor disputes to the satisfaction of all parties concerned," Miller stated.

According to Miller the decision to back Boro was unanimous because of Boro's lifelong record as a progressive Democrat.
