Good Dove Hunting Expected on Sept. 1

SACRAMENTO (U.P.)—California dove hunters will find plenty of birds in most sections of the state when the season opens Sept. 1, reports from state game wardens indicated today.

State fish and game officials point out that the dove limit has been cut from 15 to 12 birds. The limit covers the number of doves in possession at any one time.

Nearby county hunting forecasts follow:

Imperial—Hunting promises to be fully as good as usual.

Los Angeles—Only fair hunting is forecast.

San Diego—Birds are scarce in the southern part of the county and the shooting will be spotty.

San Luis Obispo—The shooting should be better than last year. The best hunting should be in the Paso Robles-Creston-Shandon-San Miguel area.

Deer Plentiful But Scattered

SACRAMENTO (U.P.)—State game wardens reported that deer hunters taking to the field on Sept. 16 will find bucks plentiful, well-fed, hard of antler and well-scattered because of favorable watering conditions.

The entire Sierra region will be thrown open for deer hunting on Sept. 16 for a 30-day season. The districts opened are 1, 1 1/2, 1 3/4, 2, 4, 4 1/2, 4 3/4, 23 and 25, and include regions from northern Humboldt county down the east side of California to the Mexican border.

The division of fish and game warned hunters that only one tag, marked with green lettering may be used in the one-deer areas. They are districts 1 3/4, Lassen, Modoc and eastern Sierran counties, and 4 1/2, Mono and Inyo counties.

The limit is two deer in all other sections, and both tags may be used. Uniformly good hunting has been reported from coast range areas, indicating that deer conditions are excellent throughout the state. The coast area closes on Sept. 15 and kills consistently higher than for past years have been reported.

Some of the best hunting, according to game wardens' reports, will be in Southern California. Reports from San Bernardino and Riverside county say the hunting there will be the best in years. San Diego county deer are reported about as plentiful as last year.
