Airplane Shop Course at H. S. Begins Sept. 16

When the 1940-41 school term begins Sept. 16 one of the most popular courses for boys at Torrance high school is expected to be the airplane sheet metal construction, new this year.

The course, directed by Leonard Austin, machine shop instructor, is designed to prepare students for jobs in aircraft plants of the Southland, according to Principal Thomas Elson.

It will be two periods daily. Equipment, including a riveting machine, is being received at the high school and plans made to accommodate a class of 41 picked students.

Torrance high school is inaugurating the instruction because educational authorities have been assured by aircraft plant personnel executives that if students follow the prescribed training they will be given preference in the plants next summer.

Rolling Hills Youth Crews As Fishing Barge Rammed, Sunk

One resident of this district is believed to have been aboard the fishing barge, Olympic II yesterday when it was rammed and sunk by a Japanese freighter while at anchor in a fog two miles at sea off Los Angeles harbor. He was Curtiss E. Johnson, 18, of Rolling Hills, who was drowned. The body was recovered by the Coast Guard. The youth was the son of the barge-master aboard the Olympic.

The freighter, Sakito Maru, struck the barge amidships and ploughed half way thru the craft, according to survivors. Seven persons were believed to have perished and 18 were rescued.

U. S. Cemetery In West Will Rival Arlington

SAN BRUNO, Aug. 28.—(U.P.)—The new Golden Gate National cemetery, planned to meet the nation's needs for the next 100 years for a final resting place for those who die in the armed service, will be dedicated here early next month. It will be opened for immediate use at that time.

The cemetery, which was authorized by Congress in June, 1937, will supersede the burial grounds at the Presidio at San Francisco, which at present is in 1883 and is now almost filled.

The Golden Gate National cemetery consists of an L-shaped 163-acre tract of land formerly known as the Sneath ranch. It is in the heart of what once were Spanish settlements in California, as indicated by the names of the roads that border it.
