

1941 Fords, Mercurys New in Size and Style



New Fords On Display Friday


Into the public spotlight Friday will roll one of America's most talked-about new cars—the 1941 Ford V-8.

When Schultz & Peckham, local Ford dealers, open their showrooms for public inspection Friday morning, visitors will see the new Ford line which includes this year, for the first time, both a DeLuxe and Super DeLuxe series of models. At the same time, new models of the Mercury 8 car, which set a modern sales record in 1939 and strengthened that position during the recently concluded model year, make their 1941 debut.

Strikingly different in design, noticeably bigger in virtually every dimension, are the new Fords. In fact, engineers state 1941 models incorporate more improvements than have been made in any single year since the introduction of the famous V-8 motor. Chief interests in the new models center around the added luxury and riding comfort made possible by size increases, according to the local dealer.



In dealers' showrooms throughout the Southland last week, the public gave an enthusiastic response to the debut of two of the nation's most strikingly different cars—the 1941 Ford V-8s and Mercurys 8s. Noticeably bigger in all dimensions and distinctively styled were the new models. Top: the new Ford Super DeLuxe sedan. more sensitive adjustment to match the new softer-acting springs, and an improved front end ride stabilizer minimizes side sway at the same time improving steering.

The second major factor contributing to the new models' smooth "boulevard ride" is found in the luxury-type springs used in seat cushions. In the Super DeLuxe models, a thick pad of latex-treated curled hair over coil springs gives a softness only associated with expensive cars in the past. Individual cushion springs in the Mercury are covered with a heavy pad of foam rubber.

Many Style Changes "Many other improvements too numerous to recount have been made in the power plant and chassis this year," the local dealers said, "for example, the use of large live-rubber body mountings which eliminate body and door rattles, and prevent the transmission of mechanical and road noises."

The six Mercury 8 body styles—the convertible club coupe, sedan coupe, five-window three- or five-passenger coupe, tudor sedan, town sedan and station wagon (entirely new to the Mercury line are the station wagon and five-window coupe)—are all powered with the popular Mercury 95 horsepower V-8 engine.

The Mercury 8 is hailed as a longer, bigger, easier-riding, faster-accelerating car. The smart new exteriors, with their bright metal speedlines, new chrome radiator grilles, chrome fender-top parking lights, and heavier bumpers with center-mounted license plates, are only a few of the points immediately observed as new on the 1941 Mercurys.

"Here again increased size has resulted in greater passenger luxury," Schultz & Peckham say. "Mercury 8 has a two-inch longer wheelbase, and a springbase increased in proportion to 129 inches. This means roomier bodies than ever before, and now the front seat width in sedans is 57 1/2 inches from door to door."

For Smoother Riding The greatly improved ride in all 1941 Ford and Mercury models has resulted from two major mechanical improvements, it was explained.

First, there is a new electrically-welded "X" type frame and center section, which makes the frame structure 100 per cent more rigid. Both front and rear springs, with a two-inch increased effective length, are softer, slower in action, and have a balanced action which eliminates "pitching." Lever-type hydraulic shock absorbers have a

Far from unnoticed by Ford Motor Company designers and style experts was the interior of the 1941 Ford and Mercury cars. Some of these changes, the local dealer said, are:

Instrument panels, newly designed, so that all gauges and the speedometer are under a single glass directly in front of the driver, where they may be clearly seen thru the clear vision two-spoke steering wheel. Gray elm graining has been used for window and door trim in the Mercury 8s, and plastic beading and trim sets off interior upholstery with charm.

Motors Operate Top It was also pointed out that hood on the new Fords and Mercurys are locked by a knob located under the instrument panel near the brake lever. This protects the engine, battery and accessories from theft.

Contributing to the gracefully streamlined exterior appearance are the bright speed lines of the newly-designed three-piece fenders, and the hidden gasoline filler cap.

An interesting feature of the convertible models in the Super DeLuxe and Mercury lines is an electrically-operated top, powered by two small electric motors and operated simply by throwing an electric switch on the dashboard. This new top
