



# News Highlights and Pictures of Torrance's Greatest Factory Frolic

## Huge Quantity of Food Barbecued for Frolic Diners



He was assisted by a staff of 12 and the Torrance American Legion Auxiliary which had charge of the ticket sale and actual filling of the paper plates with a fine barbecue dinner.

This is what it took to feed that number of Frolickers last Saturday, according to Chef Romero: 125 pounds of pink beans, 1,100 pounds of choice beef, 70 gallons of coffee, 300 pounds of lettuce and 25 gallons of green chile salsa for the salad and nearly 1,000 large rolls.

## Bullet Smashes Car Window, During Frolic Parade Saturday

Some Factory Frolicker armed with a revolver nearly caused a tragedy Saturday as the parade

was in progress. Beatrice L. Crew, 1531 West 214th street, had just gotten out of the front seat of her car, parked on a vacant lot at Cravens near El Prado, to see the procession when a leaden slug crashed thru the rear window. If she had been sitting in the

car the bullet would have struck her, she told police. Officers stated that the bullet came from a heavy calibre revolver and was shot from the direction of El Prado Park.
