Rev. Bauer New Pastor Here at Catholic Church

Succeeding the late Rev. Father Joseph V. Fitzgerald as pastor of the Catholic Church of the Nativity this week was Rev. Father Joseph Leo Bauer, who comes to Torrance from St. Kevin's Catholic church in Los Angeles. He was administrator here for the past three years.

A native of California, the new Torrance pastor is a graduate of Loyola high school and began his studies for the priesthood with five years at Menlo Park Seminary, conducted by the Sulpician Fathers. On leaving that institution, he went to Europe for advanced study and was at the great Louvain University in Belgium another five years.

Father Bauer was ordained there in 1926 by Cardinal Van Roey who is still primate of all Belgium. Returning to the United States that same year, he began a series of assistant pastorates, one of them in Long Beach where he was for three years.

Rev. Father Kelly, acting pastor here since the death of Rev. Father Fitzgerald, was transferred by Archbishop John J. Cantwell this week to St. Gregory's church in the Wilshire district. He will leave tomorrow to take up his new duties there.

"Protection after Death" is the subject of the Lessons-Sermons on Sunday in all Churches of Christ, Scientist. Paul's words to the Galatians, "Let us not be weary in well doing: for in the season we shall reap, if we faint not," constitute the Golden Text.

A Bible selection presents these verses from Isaiah: "For thou hast been a strength to the poor, a strength to the needy in this distress, a refuge from the storm, a shadow from the heat, when the blast of the terrible ones is as a storm against the wall. . . . And in this mountain shall the LORD of hosts make unto all people a feast of fat things, a feast of wines on the lees, of fat things full of marrow, of wines on the lees well refined. And he will destroy in this mountain the face of the covering cast over all people, and the veil that is spread over all nations. He will swallow up death in victory; and the Lord God will wipe away tears from off all faces; and the rebuke of his people shall he take away from off all the earth: for the LORD hath spoken it."

The Lessons-Sermons includes also this passage from "The Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy: "In Science, all being is eternal, spiritual, perfect, harmonious in every action. Let the perfect model be present in your thoughts instead of its demoralized opposite. This spiritualization of thought lets in the light, and brings the diabolical mind, life and death, into your consciousness."
