

Advent of Holiday Season Means More Desserts, Use of Beet Sugar

Well, times have changed—there was a time not so long back when liver was considered a cheap and inferior food which should be given only to Tom, the cat—now, though some people still don't care for its flavor—it is considered something of a delicacy and calves' liver at least is not cheap!

Naval Radio Station San Francisco, call NPG, will broadcast the Navy Day receiving competition message at 7:30 p. m., Oct. 27, on 4045 and 9090 Kcs. simultaneously to radio amateurs of the United States and insular possessions.

The rate of transmission will be approximately 25 words per minute. The broadcast will be preceded by a five minute continuous "CQ" call.

Each amateur copying the message should forward a copy to the American Radio Relay League at West Hartford, Connecticut, where it will be graded and the results forwarded to the Chief of Naval Operations. The Navy Department will send letters of appreciation to all persons who submit perfect copies.
