

Local C.I.O. Head Repudiates Lewis

Stating that the C.I.O. labor leader's endorsement of Wendell Willkie last Friday night "has brought only condemnation and contempt of the 10,000 loyal C.I.O. workers in this harbor area," Carl D. Steele, president of the Torrance Steel Workers' Organizing Committee, today repudiated Lewis and a vice-president of the California State C.I.O., wired a telegram of repudiation to John L. Lewis Saturday.

Answers Challenge

At the same time, Steele telegraphed President Roosevelt: "The political earthquake attempted by John L. Lewis in this harbor area, where 10,000 C.I.O. members live and work has caused no change in their determination to work and vote for your re-election on Nov. 5." Steele, in commenting on the national C.I.O. leader's speech endorsing Willkie, said that "to my knowledge not one C.I.O. unit in the whole Harbor District has followed Lewis and nearly all of them have wired or written him to that effect." The local labor leader's telegram to Lewis pointed out:

"The effect of your broadcast upon workers was that of strengthening their convictions and their determination to work with renewed vigor for the first real champion of labor, F. D. Roosevelt. You were the last man whom we would have suspected of selling for a mess of campaign promise pottage the labor gains which New Deal legislation has brought us in the past seven years and which exceeded all gains which have resulted from 60 years of striking. The votes of labor on Nov. 5 will be final acceptance of your resignation, an answer to your challenge which you ask for by repudiating the high principles of labor."

Legislature May Up Gasoline Tax

SACRAMENTO (UP)—A new attempt to increase the present three cent gasoline tax in California when the legislature convenes in January was forecast during the week as the state highway commission met to consider requests for millions of dollars worth of highway improvements.

Amerigo Bozzani, Los Angeles member of the commission, took the lead in proposing a boost in the tax, pointing out that many worthy projects in all parts of the state must be rejected each year because of insufficient funds.

A bill providing for a one-cent increase was introduced in the legislature last year but failed of passage. Bozzani did not recommend any particular amount of increase but declared highway standards are to be maintained.

California's tax of three cents per gallon is among the lowest in the United States. Motorists pay 4 1/2 cents every time they buy a gallon of gas, but 1 1/2 cents of this goes to the federal government.

OCEAN FISHING FEE ABOLITION SOUGHT

SANTA MONICA—Abolition of the \$2 state license fee for persons who engage in ocean sport fishing will be sought at the next legislative session, a group of local fishing boat operators has announced. They termed the fee "an abomination to the sportsmen of California."


