

### Delay Opening of Draft Advisory Branch Office

Opening of a Selective Service advisory board branch office in Lomita has been delayed until after questionnaires are mailed to prospective draftees, C. B. Horton said this week. The office is expected to be opened early next week at 24517 Narbonne avenue.

These advisory board members will explain selective service requirements to registrants, assist them in filling out questionnaires, and perform notary service. The office will be open from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. and in the evenings by appointment or if demand warrants. Other Lomita advisory board members, one or more of whom will be on duty at the office are Robert Neiswender, Herbert Poole, J. L. Abbott, Clarence A. Reitor, Joe French, L. F. Schiermeier and Roy Brown.

Functioning until the last of the first quota of draftees from Lomita is inducted into the service, the office will be reopened as other men are called to the colors, according to Horton, who is making arrangements.

### Tailwaggers Urge War on 'Dognappers' in County Areas

Aimed at "dognappers," the county supervisors were urged this week to give favorable consideration to an amendment to the county dog licensing ordinance, suggested by the Tailwaggers Foundation. The amendment, intended to curb dog thieves and persons making a practice of holding animals for reward, provides in essence: "Any person finding any stray domestic animal or any such animal found running at large contrary to provisions of this ordinance may take up such an animal providing the person shall within four hours notify the county poundmaster or the sheriff's department."

Violation of the section would be a misdemeanor. Los Angeles city has such a provision in its city licensing ordinance. Alford told the board in recommending the adoption of the amendment.
