And when he thus had spoken, he cried with a loud voice, Lazarus, come forth. And he that was dead came forth, bound hand and foot with graveclothes; and his face was bound about with a napkin. Jesus saith unto them, Loose him, and let him go."  
The Lesson-Sermon presents these statements from "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy: "Jesus restored Lazarus by the understanding that Lazarus had never died, but by an admission that his body had died and then lived again. "Nothing can interfere with the harmony of being nor end the existence of man in Science."

Lots of folks in Los Angeles county still own one cow, despite the growth of cities and commercial dairies.  
As a matter of fact, according to Dr. L. M. Hart, county livestock inspector, there are no less than 1,850 "one-cow herds" in the county. In addition, he said there are 1,382 two-cow herds.  
Only three operators in the county have more than 1,000 animals in their herds, although 18 herds exist in which there are between 500 and 1,000 animals.  
Although there are 100,432 dairy cattle in the county, Dr. Hart reports to the board of supervisors this week.
