

State Controller Harry B. Riley announced in Sacramento today that California relief clients will receive early checks again this Christmas season. Early payment of all relief checks which ordinarily would be delivered between Christmas and New Year's Day was ordered by Controller Riley to prevent undue hardships at Christmas on the part of the unfortunate who find themselves on the relief rolls.

"I am happy that through the cooperation of the State Relief Administration it will be possible to make early payment of relief checks," Controller Riley said. "In this way we can bring a measure of greater cheer to the less fortunate."

Crews of auditors, check writers and paymasters in the State Controller's Los Angeles and San Francisco offices will work over-undue hardships at Christmas on the part of the unfortunate who find themselves on the relief rolls.
