THE LATE "LADY" AND HER 1939 BROOD
... South American disease proves fatal

They took "Lady," one of the best known dogs in Torrance, away on Thanksgiving Day and destroyed her with chloroform, a victim of a strange paralysis which many dog owners believe is attacking the nation's canine population following its entry from South America a few months ago.

"Lady," a beautiful Irish setter whose gleaming red coat had been petted by hundreds of Torrance moppets and adults, contacted the disease about three weeks ago. Despite all treatment she was unable to throw it off and resume her ambling about the city. She was owned by Earl Lock of 1323 Portola

avenue. A thoroughbred, she was as courteous as the most genteel matron in Torrance and her many friends are missing her grave but inquisitive pursuit of dog interests that covered most of the city.

"Lady" is survived by 11 children who were born just before Mother's Day last year.

Tax collections reached approximately \$14,000,000 for the week ending with Thanksgiving, County Tax Collector H. L. Byram announced today.

With Dec. 5 as the deadline to pay the first installment taxes without penalties, the total at the end of the third week was only 12 per cent of the amount to be collected.

Byram's office, which acts as tax collector for 39 of the 45 cities, has a total of \$123,965,000 to collect for the county, the 39 cities and the various special districts, such as flood control.

This total is about \$3,200,000 less than the amount that was to be collected last year.
