Co. Hospital's Trial Ward Adults Only Fraction of Applicants

Twelve percent of the persons who come to the General Hospital for hospitalization are sent home, as result of a more thorough examination at the trial ward, or admitting ward, according to a report from the hospital's Advisory committee of doctors.

Only 65 percent are admitted to wards in the huge hospital, 9 1/2 percent are sent to clinics, 11 1/4 percent are referred to X-ray, 2 1/2 percent are ordered to private hospitals and 1 1/4 percent are referred to rest homes. This ward keeps persons out of the hospital who are not eligible or who do not actually need hospital care when they report. Obviously it keeps the operating costs of the hospital down and permits only persons who are gravely ill to be given nursing and medical care.

Physical Makeup of High School Provides First-Class Facilities

(Following is the ninth article in the series "Know Your Torrance High School" written especially for this newspaper.) By THOMAS H. ELSON, Principal of Torrance High School

For those who think in terms of statistics, we offer this week some figures which present another phase of our subject.

It is a source of pride to our citizens as well as our students and teachers, that Torrance high school has one of the most beautiful and spacious campuses of those of the entire system or of Southern California, for that matter.

Most of the large high school plants in Los Angeles are confined to about half the acreage of the local school. The setting furnished by the original park which occupied the grounds has been so rearranged and modified as to give each building an unusually attractive outlook.

Building Facilities There are five reinforced concrete buildings housing offices, library, study hall, shops, science and food laboratories, sewing, music, typing, drafting, and other special rooms, and 29 class rooms, together with all necessary utility, stock, and supply rooms.

The gymnasium building contains a large floor for physical education classes, girls' locker rooms, shower and dressing rooms, a well equipped corrective room, a rest room and sun room.

The boys' physical education building is of the latest type for that purpose. It contains locker-dressing rooms, tiled shower and drying rooms, equipment rooms and offices.

Plenty Playgrounds The Assembly Hall, seating a thousand persons, is one of the most attractive auditorium buildings to be found in any school. It is 98 per cent acoustically perfect and completely equipped with dressing rooms, projection room, ticket office, and rest rooms. Its lighting equipment, drapes, etc., are in keeping with all school needs.

The school's playground facilities include a full size athletic field with bleachers to accommodate 1,500, a girls' playground, outdoor basketball and other courts for both boys and girls and two tennis courts.

Three portable bungalows are used for special purposes, one for the work in agriculture, two for the cafeteria, and one for club meetings. A complete new cafeteria building is being planned for. An adequate plot is set aside for the use of the agriculture classes containing a bath house and pens for poultry and small animal husbandry.

Second High in Cost The plant has an assessed valuation of \$797,281.96 spread as follows: Value of land \$ 72,128.66 Buildings and appurtenances 604,051.11 Equipment 121,102.19 There was expended for the education of each student enrolled last year \$196.84 which is the highest figure of any high school in the system with the exception of Canoga Park.

The present enrollment is, in round numbers, 900. The school is manned by a faculty of 40 members. The average students per teacher last year was 20.9 which assures plenty of personal attention for each individual student. The figure for this year will undoubtedly be as good. Other members of the staff include a dozen custodial and maintenance employees, two clerical and two WPA assistants. The library contains several hundred volumes in addition to an equal number of free text books. It would seem from these figures that our high school students were adequately provided for in the matter of physical equipment and services.

Bomb Fatalities Less Than Auto Dead

DALLAS, Tex. (U.P.)—Three times as many persons were killed during August by automobiles in the United States as by bombers in England and Germany, according to the Accident Division of the Texas Department of Safety.

During the month, 145 persons were killed in Texas alone and 3,045 in the nation. Press releases showed 3,045 bombing victims in Britain and 600 in Germany during the period, the bureau said.
