Lake Is Army Test 'Ground'

SALT LAKE CITY (U.P.)—The Great Salt Lake has been converted to a new use.

Handicapped by the federal government's inability to obtain clearance on the Wendover bombing range, officers of the 7th Army Bombardment Squadron, based at Salt Lake City, have chosen the lake as a practice zone.

Fleets of four-motored "flying fortress" planes unload several tons of smoke bombs on the lake's waters each week.

A floating target has been anchored at one point of a triangle which includes objectives on two of the lake's desolate and uninhabited islands.

The bombardments have attracted thousands of spectators. Although the bombs used in the practice flights are relatively harmless, officers have warned residents to avoid any "duds," which might be deadly at close range.

The drill course lies several miles from the resort beaches which draw throngs of bathers in summer months. Officers of the squadron and of the Fifth Air Base group said the lake would be used only temporarily. The Wendover range, comprising 1,650,000 acres of desert land near the Nevada border, originally was approved for use. Protests of sheepmen who use portions of the area for grazing brought postponement of clearance by the Department of Interior.

Baptists Burn Mortgages at Dinner-Meet

With nearly 300 witnessing the ceremony, mortgages of both the First Baptist church and parsonage were burned last Thursday night during the course of a musical program that followed an old-fashioned community Thanksgiving dinner.

Turkey and all the fixins were served to the gathering in the basement of the church. Afterward, the congregation adjourned to the main auditorium where the program was presented.

The original mortgage on the church, according to Rev. C. M. Northrup, was approximately \$5,000 and the parsonage debt was about \$2,000. The church debt, the pastor explained, had been largely paid off during the past five years.

Baptists here expended approximately \$3,000 annually for the running expenses of the church. Improvements, amounting to an investment of about \$2,000 have made the church one of the best-equipped in the city. At the present time there are about 350 members. Rev. Northrup has been pastor since June, 1935.

Vicar to Devote Full Time to Church Here

The vestry of St. Andrew's Episcopal church unanimously voted this week to adopt a budget for next year that will permit Rev. Thomas R. Marshall to devote all his services to the parish in Torrance. The action came as the result of the "every member financial canvass" conducted during November. The tentative budget adopted at the beginning of the canvass has been met in full by the pledges of members and friends of the church.

Rev. Marshall has been vicar of St. Andrew's since April 1937. He has served this parish on a part time basis as he also was vicar of St. John's Episcopal church in Wilmington. The increased size of St. Andrew's has made it possible to separate the work in the two communities. The change in schedule will be made Dec. 15.
