Gift Nights at Theaters Start Next Tuesday

First of a series of Christmas Gift Nights at the Torrance and Grand theatres will be held next Tuesday evening, Dec. 10, when a large number of valuable presents obtained from local merchants will be displayed. The theatres' patrons will have an opportunity to acquire these gifts in advance of Christmas by obtaining sales slips of "gift tickets" from the stores participating in the event.

Stanley Tobin, manager of the two theatres, announces that those holding such slips should be present at either one of the show houses next Tuesday night for the first presentation. Other gift nights are scheduled for Tuesday, Dec. 17, and Thursday, Dec. 24.

Professionals' Status Under Draft Clarified

Professional men, including lawyers, doctors and dentists—and also proprietors of one-man commercial establishments—must be considered as eligible for Selective Service training although every effort will be made to protect the welfare of the community as it is affected by their services. C. A. Dykstra, director of Selective Service announced today.

Answering numerous inquiries concerning occupational deferment of professional men, Dykstra emphasized that such cases will be passed upon by local boards in the same manner as they consider the status of other registrants.

Conceding that the questions of deferment concerning professional men and proprietors of small commercial establishments present more definite and knotty problems, Dykstra declared:

"The hard cases arise where the community which these individuals serve have several similar services. For example, take the case of a young dentist who has just been graduated from school and has gone into debt in order to purchase equipment necessary to his profession.

"There are several other dentists serving the same community more or less satisfactorily. The question arises—is such a person eligible for deferment by reason of his occupation? Obviously, a good case of disruption to the economy or society of the community, cannot be made. The hardship here is not to the community, but to the individual."

Director Dykstra also said that the young lawyer "who has just acquired his first two or three clients and who may find himself without these clients upon his return from training and who has no employer to look to for a return of his job is probably making a greater sacrifice than the garage mechanic whose job will be waiting for him upon his return and who has no individual clients or customers to lose."
