

Torrance Loses to El Segundo; Flu Hits Teams

Influenza stalked into the Marine League basketball schedule Tuesday and forced postponement of two games—Gardena at Narbonne and San Pedro at Banning. Torrance and El Segundo who escaped the flu epidemic played their engagements, the Tartars taking another one-point loss in an overtime varsity game, the score being El Segundo 27, Torrance 26.

The postponed games will probably be played the first week in January. Three of Narbonne's varsity and three of Banning's varsity were unable to participate, hence the cancellation of the games.

El Segundo's Bee squad defeated the Torrance Bees 18 to 12 and the Oilers' Class C and D teams contributed to the clean sweep enjoyed by El Segundo.

The Cees won from Torrance 20 to 19 and the Dees triumphed over the local Peewees 12 to 10. Niel, El Segundo varsity forward, was high-scoring in the feature tussle, getting 11 points. El Segundo led at half-time, 18 to 12. A free throw allowed in the closing seconds of an overtime period won the game for the Oilers.

SANTA ANITA OPENING WILL BE BRILLIANT

With leading thoroughbreds of the country and outstanding foreign importations on the ground and nominated for the \$100,000 added Santa Anita Handicap and the \$50,000 added Santa Anita Derby, Santa Anita Park seems assured of the most prestigious opening—Saturday, Dec. 28, during the seven winters it has been running.

That a banner attendance will be recorded is indicated by the early arrival and increased reservations from out-of-state visitors and the local enthusiasts who have taken up their season boxes and memberships in the Turf Club. Added facilities are offered with two permanent buildings in the infield, the new tunnel that leads from the paddock at ground level, and general major improvements.

The opening day feature of the California Breeders' Champion Stakes will provide the most important and richest event ever run by state-bred horses. It is estimated that there will be around \$24,000 at stake with 72 of the finest California two-year-olds eligible to enter.

For the New Year holiday the following Wednesday, a field of the country's top stakes winners will go to the post in a \$10,000 added handicap. Santa Anita usually attracts its second largest crowd of the season, drawing the thousands who attend the Tournament of Roses Parade in Pasadena in the morning, and a stellar turf card is in the making.

To round out the opening week the San Felipe Stakes Saturday, Jan. 4, will bring out for the first time the array of candidates in line for the Santa Anita Derby.

State Ranks 8th in Number of Licensed Hunters

SACRAMENTO, (UP)—California ranks eighth in the nation in the number of hunters holding state licenses, but is second in the amount of fish and game fees collected, U. S. Department of the Interior figures revealed today.

In 1939, California issued licenses to 368,195 hunters and fishermen, while Michigan, with the most licenses, issued 858,362 licenses. Other states topping California were Illinois, 411,566; Indiana, 456,739; Minnesota, 691,983; New York, 644,768; Ohio, 627,972; and Pennsylvania, 408,006.

However, California collected \$746,142, which was exceeded only by \$1,151,687, collected by New York. Michigan collected \$613,526.
