\$866 Appropriations**


Appropriations approved by the city council Tuesday night totaled \$866.23. The items were as follows: \$69.60 for street signs, \$169 for repairs to Abalone avenue from 230th street to Plaza del Amo, \$127.80 for fertilizer for city parks, \$172.90 for repairs and painting of venetian blinds at the public library, \$140 for new kitchen equipment at the Civic Auditorium, \$137.50 for installation of 19 meters and connections for the Vista Highlands sewer project which is now nearly 90 percent complete, \$168.35 for 80 lead "goosenecks" complete for the water department and \$10.88 for 24 one-inch meter connections.

Wants Recruits**

Applications for enlistment in the various classes of the U. S. Naval Reserve are now being taken at the Naval and Marine Corps Reserve Armory, North Figueroa and Bernard street, near Elysian Park in Los Angeles between 8:30 a. m. and 4 p. m. daily except Saturday when the office closes at 12 o'clock noon.

Reserve recruits are subject to active duty at any time their service is desired with the U. S. Navy. Ex-Navy men can enlist in ratings for which they are qualified and men under 28 years of age can apply for enlistment in the Volunteer or Organized Reserve.

Men under 35 years of age with at least a high school education can apply for enlistment in Class V-3, U. S. Naval Reserve, for training as radio-men or signalmen ratings.
