

New School Term Begins Monday

Minimum sessions will be held at Torrance grade schools tomorrow and on Monday when the new term begins. School will commence at Torrance Elementary, Fern Avenue and Waverly at 8 o'clock in the morning Friday, Jan. 31 and Monday, Feb. 3. Kindergarten pupils will be released at 10:20 a. m.; first, second and third grades at 11:40 a. m. and fourth, fifth and sixth grades at 12:20 p. m.

Beginners who are five years of age or who will become five years of age on or before May 3, 1941, may be admitted to the kindergarten if they present themselves for enrollment during the first month of school of the second semester, which closes Friday, Feb. 26.

Children entering first grade who have not attended kindergarten may be admitted if they will be six years of age on or before May 3, 1941. A new rule adopted by the Superintendent for admission of beginning pupils takes effect this semester. This makes it obligatory on parents to present a birth certificate or recognize proof of age for children entering kindergarten or first grade for the first time. Documents which will be accepted as proof of age consist of birth certificates, baptismal certificates, family Bible record, passport or an insurance policy over two years old.
