County Forester Bags Bobcat

Sam Trout, forest patrolman at the county's Kagel canyon patrol station, was consulting a taxidermist today, at the suggestion of Spence Turner, county game warden. A real Western bob cat with tasseled ears, a short stubby tail and a grayish buff coat, a type not commonly seen, was bagged by the patrolman along a firebreak in Kagel Canyon over the weekend.

Using an Austrian rifle with a telescopic sight, Trout shot the animal in the throat at a distance of 350 yards. It was brought to the Arroyo Seco division headquarters on Foothill boulevard, La Canada, where other forest patrolmen came to see it.

Expect Decision Soon on Labor Case at Market

The labor controversy centering around the K. V. Hinkley market at 24020 Narbonne avenue remained unchanged this week while Superior Judge Emmet H. Wilson deliberated on the case as submitted to him recently. Judge Wilson is expected to rule on the matter early next week.

The question, according to Mrs. Hinkley, centers around whether or not her employees who are affiliated with the C. I. O. can be "forced to quit that affiliation and join the A. F. of L." Mrs. Hinkley reports that the case is being regarded as a vital test issue for jurisdictional disputes in Southern California and the outcome may set an important precedent in labor annals.

Uniform Salaries for Policemen Are Suggested to City

If a resolution by the Peace Officers' Association of California is followed, local gardeners may enjoy a uniform salary schedule that provides for increases of three and one-half percent annually to the maximum for their rank. The city council heard the resolution Tuesday night and ordered it filed for future reference.

Shortly afterward, promotions with resultant increases in pay were confirmed for five Torrance officers on motion by Councilman George V. Powell, police commissioner. Having finished their probationary periods, Frank Schumacher and Ernest Ashton were made permanent captains with pay of \$185 per month. Percy Bennett, William Evans and Willard H. Haslam were appointed permanent sergeants with pay of \$175 per month.

The Peace Officers' pay scale suggested for cities under 50,000 population follows: Patrolmen, \$1,800 to \$2,280; corporals, \$2,040 to \$2,400; sergeants, \$2,160 to \$2,640; lieutenants, \$2,400 to \$2,760; captains, \$2,520 to \$3,000, and chief, \$2,700 to \$4,200.

Two Trucks and Sedan In Collision

Two trucks, one of them a Torrance garbage vehicle, and a sedan were involved and damaged in a three-machine crash at Torrance boulevard and Hawthorne avenue Monday morning but no one was injured, according to police reports.

The garbage truck, driven by Bob Lampere, and a sedan, operated by John B. McNulty of Redondo Beach, were east bound on the boulevard while another truck, piloted by R. Willisie, Long Beach, was going north on Hawthorne.

Council Frowns On Dump Yard Request by Brick Company

Altho no action was taken, members of the city council indicated Tuesday night that the request of the Star Brick and Tile Company for permission to establish a dump between 174th and 178th streets along Western avenue probably would not be granted. The matter was referred to the Planning Commission for recommendation.

Mayor Tom McGuire pointed out that even if the brick company erected a seven-foot tight fence in front of the dump near Western that such a barrier would not conceal the grounds from view because of the terrain. He also stated that Western is eventually to be a 100-foot artery and when widened the street would be within three feet of the dump grounds.

"I don't think we should open the way to making North Torrance the dumping grounds for this part of the metropolitan area," he said and other councilmen nodded their agreement.
