

Supplementary Services for Hi School Education Listed

Following is the 17th article in the series "Know Your Torrance High School" written especially for this newspaper...

In addition to and supplementing regular services which the high school tries to render are several more of a special type. Every day a light truck carries out from the central offices and delivers to the school, in addition to the mail, a great variety of special education materials.

Slides: Sound and silent motion pictures especially prepared for educational purposes are available. Slides: The same fields are covered in slides with literally thousands of them on order.

Transcriptions: Transcriptions of musical numbers of all kinds, of ceremonies and public programs, such as the dedication ceremony of the Boulder Dam, are stored in our central library and may be secured in short order.

Exhibit Materials: These consist of a great variety of pictures, models, collections and charts. As an example—in connection with the instruction in safety, sections of city and country in miniature and built to scale are sent to each school. These models each illustrate several major traffic problems and the modern highway construction planned to solve them.

Equipment: All equipment incidental to use of these materials is either loaned or furnished. This includes, stereoscopes, film and slide projectors, turn tables, phonographs, etc.

Equipment: Good equipment available for classroom and auditorium use. When special occasion demands local merchants cooperate by loaning additional equipment.

To assist in the utilization of radio programs our central office issues weekly news letters and clip sheets with complete schedules and analyses of available programs. Approximately 25 of these programs are thus treated weekly.

These materials are extensively used in classrooms, clubs and assemblies.

The excursion program includes the transportation of groups of students and teachers, to museums, the planetarium, the courts, jails and other public institutions, art galleries, tar pits, manufacturing and processing plants, the zoological gardens, parks, radio station and points of material interest. School busses are utilized for this service.

The library and text book division has a wide scope of services to render to the school of which full advantage is taken. These include circulation of book exhibits, loans deposits, manuscripts and special materials.

Excursion Schedule: The high school feels that these modern services enable it to keep in the forefront of educational progress. When education cannot be brought to the school the school is taken to the source of education.

The special service supplementary program makes educational theory more understandable because it reduces it to concrete terms and illustrates it with specific examples.

The excursion schedule of this year includes the following trips: Art-4, Music-2, Agriculture-4, Social Studies-4, Home Economics-3, Commerce-2, and Clubs-6.

NOTICE OF AGREEMENT TO PURCHASE LANDS DEERED TO THE STATE FOR DELINQUENT TAXES
NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN by the undersigned Tax Collector of the County of Los Angeles, State of California, in accordance with the provisions of Sections 3897.3 and 3897.4 of the Political Code and the written authorization of the State Controller, as follows:

That an agreement has been made between the Board of Supervisors of said County of Los Angeles and City of Torrance and approved by the State Controller of the State of California, giving to said City, on terms set forth in said agreement, the right to purchase all of the right, title, and interest of the State in and to all of the real property hereinafter described, all of which said property has been decided to the State for delinquent taxes. A copy of said agreement is on file in the office of said Board of Supervisors.

That said agreement shall not become effective until 21 days after the first publication and

the mailing of this notice as provided in said section 3897.4 and if within 21 days after the first publication and the mailing of this notice, said property or any of it is redeemed or sale postponed, as provided in the Political Code, or if said property or any of it is thereafter redeemed or sale postponed before said City shall have complied with all of the terms of purchase set forth in said agreement, then said agreement shall become null and void as to the property so affected, but if said property or any of it is not redeemed or sale postponed, then whenever said City shall have complied with all of the terms of said agreement required for the purchase of said property or any portion thereof, the undersigned Tax Collector will make, execute, and deliver to said City a deed to said property, as provided in said Section 3897.4 of the Political Code. For information as to the amount necessary to redeem or postpone sale apply to H. L. Byram, County Tax Collector, 3rd Floor, Hall of Justice.
