Many New Bills Concern County

About one-sixth of the first 1,000 bills introduced into the 1941 Legislature have some bearing on the Los Angeles county government, according to the analysis now being made by the county bureau of administrative research.
Heretofore this work has been done by Assistant County Counsel H. W. Kennedy, but with the enormous number of bills introduced the job has become too much for one man to do, and has been turned over to a staff of a half dozen men under direction of Harry S. Scoville. Scoville's staff will in turn report to Wayne Allen, the board's chief officer who will report to the board of supervisors then will ask Kennedy to support bills of benefit to the county, and oppose those that would saddle increased costs on the county.
Most voluminous bill received at the Hall of Records to date is one of 282 pages, but it seeks to codify existing laws, instead of proposing any new laws. Last session the county was concerned with a total of 105 bills, which the supervisors supported and sought the cooperation of the county delegation to obtain passage. This number was later reduced to some 90 bills, the figures not including the bills with only an indirect effect on the county.

PRINCIPAL ELSON REPORTS IMPROVEMENTS AT T.H.S. DURING HIS ADMINISTRATION

Following is the 18th article in the series "Know Your Torrance High School" written especially for this newspaper. . . . By THOMAS H. ELSON, Principal of Torrance High School

This article is, in a sense, an accounting of our stewardship of Torrance high school during the past five years and one-half years. Mere physical growth is not a measure of the progress of a physical extension and expansion do help one to visualize the progress made in the achievement of its objectives.

Personnel: At the present time there are 18 members of the faculty, a head custodian and six assistants, an engineer, a head gardener and toolkeeper who joined the staff of the high school during the period stated. This means, in round numbers, a replacement of 50 percent of the original staff.

These are the natural changes which take place in the course of time in any institution. Involved in the change in the personnel are certain changes in activities. Sixteen new courses and activities have been added, including orchestra and band, additional instruction in boys' and girls' physical education, a course in aircraft construction, continuation work for employed boys and girls, additional commercial instruction and a part-time counselor service.

On the custodial staff an engineer has been added. The W. P. A. has added a girls' restroom attendant and a library assistant. The student enrollment during this time has increased 20 percent.

Internal Reorganization: These past five years have gradually brought about certain internal reorganization movements some of which are as follows:
1. Development and extension of a safety system including elimination of safety hazards about the campus, instruction in safety measures, establishment of first aid supply stations, safe driving and auto parking, and cooperative action with the fire and police departments.

2. Reorganization of student government.
3. Reorganization of disciplinary system.
4. Organization of faculty committees and their programs in curriculum, audio-visual education, improvement of reading, improvement of study, vocational guidance and placement, junior orientation, health, professional reading, and student government.

New Buildings and Other Plans: Improvements: Two new, latest type, buildings have been added. A fully equipped physical education building for boys and an assembly hall seating 988. In addition, the old gymnasium has been partially remodeled. Most of the buildings have been repainted, inside and out. A new student refreshment stand has been built, heating facilities have been extended including an additional boiler and an increased fuel storage, and an athletic score board has been built.

Grounds: The entire grounds have been cleared and cleaned, underbrush removed and trees

HEALTH EXPO HAS MANY FEATURES
