

Sheriff Issues Warning on Ad Solicitation

Sheriff Eugene W. Biscalluz this week issued a county-wide warning to the public to be on the alert against advertising solicitors using telephones to sell advertising purportedly for an official publication of the Sheriff's office.

"We never have and do not intend to publish anything," Sheriff Biscalluz said, "which requires public solicitation of advertising. Just now there are several advertising enterprises actively engaged in soliciting advertising by telephone saying the matter is for an official magazine for this office. The Sheriff's office is in no way connected with any of these schemes and the public is asked to ignore such advertising requests for they are purely fraudulent."

License Examiners Resume Renewals of Motor Permits

Now that the rush of license plate registrations is over, drivers license examiners throughout California this week were instructed by James M. Carter, director of motor vehicles, to resume renewals of 1929 "good until revoked" licenses.

Approximately 1,000,000 drivers in California, Carter said, are still using good until revoked licenses issued between Jan. 1 and August 14, 1929, and urged all drivers to go to the nearest examining office and renew their licenses.

Within a few weeks, he said, the department plans to cancel them as a safety move, and early applicants can avoid the rush, which will be sure to follow the cancellation order. Good until revoked licenses issued in 1927 and 1928 were cancelled several months ago.

It is necessary, Paul Mason, chief of the division of drivers licenses explained, to clean up all these old licenses before Sept. 1 when the first block of the new four year licenses will expire.


