

DISPUTE OVER SALES TAX IS UNDECIDED

SACRAMENTO (U.P.) — The dispute between the Federal government and the state of California over collection of the three percent state sales tax on materials used for national defense reached a head at a meeting of the state board of equalization and interested parties this week.

Attorney General Earl Warren has ruled that the state is entitled to collect some \$5,000,000 in taxes on defense materials used to date. But the Federal government steadfastly has refused to permit manufacturers to include the tax in figuring costs of materials.

The government's stand was reiterated by U. S. Attorneys who attended the meeting. Also present besides Warren and board of equalization members were representatives of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, the army and navy, material dealers and contractors and the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce.

Most national defense manufacturers are operating on a "cost plus" basis, allowing them up to 10 percent profit. They contend they should be permitted to include the sales tax in figuring production costs.

After telegraphing Attorney General Robert H. Jackson for an opinion, the group agreed to meet March 10 to discuss the problem with legislators.

The legislature already has exempted airplane materials from the sales levy under an act adopted in 1939. Senator Ed Fletcher of San Diego introduced a measure at the January "short session" of the present legislature to declare a moratorium on tax collections on defense contract materials. It was suggested that passage of the Fletcher bill might afford the best solution of the problem.

Tax Assessing Season Begins on March 3rd

Tax assessing season for the current year will begin March 3. Every person is required by law to file a written statement of all of his real and personal property between 12 o'clock noon on the first Monday of March and 5 p. m. on the last Monday of June each year.

Real estate tax bills will be premailed only to those who have filed a written statement with the County Assessor during the assessing season. Exemptions to those entitled thereto can be granted only to those filing a statement as above provided.

Tax payers may make such statement to the deputy when he calls, or at any office of the County Assessor. Values placed upon personal property upon which statements are made in the office, are subject to inspection and revision by the Field Deputies.

If the deputy is unable to contact the taxpayer on his first visit, an estimate of the value of the personal property will be made and notice to that effect left at the address of such property. (No second calls will be made by the Field Deputies). The taxpayer should as soon as convenient, and not later than June 1, if possible, take such notice to the office of the County Assessor, or any of its branches, in order that proper statement may be made and the taxpayer granted any exemption to which he may be entitled.

SACRAMENTO (U.P.) — Assemblyman Jack Teimey has introduced a bill in the California Legislature calling for the disbarment of attorneys who are members of the communist groups.

The bill also would require new attorneys to take an oath that they are not members of subversive organizations. Assemblyman Tenney says the measure probably would affect 10 known communists.
