

It was fortunate when Johnny Rawlings, old timer who played with the Giants in 1922 and the Pirates in 1925 and saw World Series action on the infield, agreed with Johnny Angel, Sr., scout of the Cleveland Indians, to manage the Torrance Indians. Rawlings knows his baseball and hopes the people will like his method of play. With Rawlings on the managerial staff is Johnny Angel Jr., as business manager, Ray Brown as field captain and Johnny Angel Sr. as team supervisor.

Angel Sr. states that the people of Torrance will see a team equal to that of any Class E baseball club.

It is up to the citizens of surrounding communities to support baseball and give many youngsters the chance to become future major league stars.

### Army Teams May Enter State Semi-Pro Baseball Tournaments

Army baseball teams, expected to be highly improved this summer as result of the draft, will be permitted to enter state semi-pro tournaments, according to a recent ruling by Ray Dumont, president of the National Semi-Pro Congress. Four such teams will be allowed to enter the state tournaments having 16 clubs entered while eight will be permitted in the 32-team meets.

Professional players taken into the Army after June 1, the usual deadline for professional eligibility, will be allowed to play and soldiers in uniform will be admitted free to the national tournament at Wichita, Kan.

Just how much effect the ruling will have on the California tournament in Torrance next July is uncertain.
