SUGGESTIONS FOR COOKING CHICKEN:

Allow one-half pound dressed chicken per person, per serving.

ROASTING: Remove pin feathers from cleaned bird. Wash inside and out. Dry and stuff with desired stuffing; sew up skin of opening with close wad skewer. Tie wings and legs close to body with string. Arrange on rack of broiling pan, or in bottom of roaster. Rub with butter, salt and pepper. Prepare two cups of flour with enough water to form a mixture that can be rolled. Roll to 1/4-inch thickness and place over fowl. Have blanket so it hangs down well over the side of chicken. Patch any breaks in blanket. Add about one cup of water and place in hot oven (400 to 450 degrees) for fifteen minutes, then reduce heat (to 350 degrees) for rest of cooking period. Add little water from time to time as necessary. When removing blanket, chip off with hammer to avoid lifting outer skin of bird.

BROILING: Single, and cut cleaned bird in two, lengthwise. Arrange on broiling rack, cut side up, at least six inches from heat. Season and cook until done, brushing twice with melted butter or shortening. Season and serve.

FRYING: Cut young chicken in pieces. Roll in flour and brown quickly in hot fat. Season, reduce heat and continue cooking with cover on pan until tender. Remove cover last five minutes of frying. Serve with milk gravy.
