

SLAVERY FOR BRITONS SAID NAZI AIM

If true, the following extract from the London Daily Express, recently received by Henry McCulloch of 2413 Torrance boulevard in a letter from his native Scotland, reveals why Britons are determined to fight invasion "step by step, street by street and house by house," as Prime Minister Churchill declared several months ago.

The clipping is titled "Nazi Plan for Britain." It reports: "I told you last week how the Germans intended to make us slaves if they conquered us. Some foolish people who do not understand the Germans doubt that. Let them ponder over this. It was sent to me last week by a British general. It is a note of what was said to him not so very long ago by an active Nazi agent operating in a country which has since fallen to Germany:

Future Population
"As soon as we beat England we shall make an end of you English once and for all. Able-bodied men and women will be exported as slaves to the continent. The old and weak will be exterminated.

"All men remaining in Britain—as slaves—will be sterilized. A million or two of the young women of the Nordic type will be segregated in a number of stud farms, where, with the assistance of picked German sires, they will during a period of 10 or 12 years produce nearly annually a series of Nordic infants to be brought up as Germans.

"These infants will form the future population of Britain. They will be partially educated in Germany and only those who fully satisfy Nazi requirements will be allowed to return to Britain and take up permanent residence. The rest will be sterilized and sent to join the slave gangs in Germany. Thus in a generation or two the British will disappear."

"You may think no nation would do this—not even Germany. But remember it is being done in Poland today. Every German you leave alive if an invasion comes brings you a shade nearer such a Nazi paradise."

"Where is a good place to eat?" "Do you know anyone who buys old furniture?" "I want to get something nice for a wedding present."

For fascinating "true stories" read the ads. They tell what interests the American of March 1941.

The Palos Verdes Anglers club held a banquet at their regular meeting last Thursday at the Hollywood Riviera club and 60 members and guests attended. Movies, hi-jinks and community singing were enjoyed after the banquet.

The club is unique in several respects. Organized by fishermen who fish for sport and are interested in the preservation of game fish, the club has met for

the past three years twice a month. Members attend in hip boots and fishing garb and after the business meeting fish from the sands where they have floodlights and guaranteed scales, a prize being given each meeting to the one who catches the biggest fish.



Other Cities Get Airport Grants

Belief of local supporters of a project to construct an airport for the use of commercial and amateur fliers and aircraft firms in South Torrance on the Western Ranch property that Federal funds can be obtained to improve the site was borne out this week in a report on the contracts and expenditures in California for the national defense program.

This report, covering the period from Feb. 1 to 15, showed that 15 contracts have been released for as many airports in the state at a total cost of \$5,245,704 to the WPA. Local airport backers assert that Torrance can secure a WPA project for improvement of a Torrance airport under the national defense program.

The government report lists these cities and amounts for airports: Chico, \$40,822; Redding, \$198,443; Visalia, \$313,670; Long Beach, \$128,594; Oxnard, \$197,000; Bakersfield, \$503,201; Palm Springs, \$470,000; Santa Barbara, \$1,200,000; Daggett, \$389,000; Ontario, \$351,300; San Diego, \$537,600; Palmdale, \$951,500; Merced, \$118,328; Paso Robles, \$254,346; and Oroville, \$196,902.

He moved that henceforth no one is to be employed by the city without such notice and consent of the majority of the council in the future. The motion was seconded by Councilman John V. Murray and carried unanimously.
