**Local Paint Store Lends Color Scheme Collection to Householders**

A giant collection of hundreds of color photos of rooms and homes decorated with modern paint colors has arrived here and will be on display at the Torrance Paint and Wallpaper Store, 1119 Sartori ave. The collection, which was compiled by the Decorative Studios of the Sherwin-Williams Company, nationally-known paint manufacturers, will also be lent to householders by the local paint store during the coming weeks.

According to the Company's color experts, the huge guide not only shows exactly how ready-to-use paint colors look in any room, thereby eliminating guesswork and disappointment, but it can teach the average person how to use color in the home. There would be fewer drab homes in America, they contend, if people could see a color combination before it is actually painted on the walls.

Some of the Guide's pointers on color include: Use light wall colors if a room is dark; paint ceilings white or a pale color for greater light or if the ceiling is low; use warm paint colors such as rose, dusty pinks, yellows to make a room seem cozier; use deep, restful colors for dens or libraries; and gay, cheery colors in breakfast nooks and informal dining-rooms. The guide shows hundreds of color schemes for every room in the house as well as for house exteriors.

**No Time Lost at New L. B. Plant for Douglas Co.**

Workmen started Monday morning uncrating lathes and other machine tools for installation in the Douglas Company's new North Long Beach plant, in building No. 6, while the contractor was putting on the finishing touches to the structure. Not a minute is being lost.

About 100 inspectors, machinemen and timekeepers were summoned Monday to prepare the machinery for the production and assembly lines. Three bays, each 300 by 50 feet, are being used for setting up the machines on wooden skids, on which they will be moved into place when engineers are ready to string out the assembly lines.

Some of the jigs and certain other parts to be used in building the Douglas bombers and transport planes at the new plant are being made at the Santa Monica and El Segundo plants. Certain of the employees at the two plants now operating have been designated as the "Long Beach group," and will become key men in the new plant.

May 1 will see the offices of the Douglas Company in Long Beach moved into Building No. 5 at the plant, and control of the huge plant will be centralized there from then on, according to plans.

By July 4, the new plant will be operating, and will have a payroll of \$500,000 a week, according to Geoffrey Morgan, public relations counsel.

**Board Rejects New Geyer Plea**

With the exception of Mrs. Fay Allen, who wanted the board to rescind its previous action which ended Geyer's affiliation as a teacher in the Gardena high school, members stuck to their former decision that according to school rules no teachers except those in military service can be given leaves for four consecutive semesters.

Geyer's case was appealed to the board by State Senator Robert Kenney, who likened all government service to military service and suggested the board grant leaves to officeholders until "six months after he is defeated for reelection."

Two teacher organizations supported Kenney's proposal. Mrs. Allen's call for a new vote, however was ruled out on the grounds no one who supports a losing motion can again bring the matter to vote. She supported Geyer's two previous requests for extended leave.

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**No Rubber Crisis If War Comes**
