This verse from Proverbs, "He that covereth his sins shall not prosper; but whoso confesseth and forsaketh them shall have mercy," is the Golden Text in the Lesson-Sermon on "Everlasting Punishment" on Sunday in all Churches of Christ, Scientist.

The Lesson-Sermon includes this parable by Jesus from Luke: "Two men went up into the temple to pray; the one a Pharisee, and the other a publican. The Pharisee stood and prayed thus with himself, 'God, I thank thee, that I am not as other men are, extortioners, unjust, adulterers, or even as this publican. I fast twice in the week, I give tithes of all that I possess.' And the publican, standing afar off, would not lift up so much as his eyes unto heaven, but smote upon his breast, saying, 'God be merciful to me a sinner.' If you, this man went down to his house justified rather than the other: for every one that exalteth himself shall be abased; and he that humbleth himself shall be exalted."
Passages from "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy state: "Blindness and self-righteousness cling fast to iniquity. When the Publican's wall went out to the great heart of Love, it won his humble desire." "In the quiet sanctuary of earnest tending, we must deny sin and plead God's aliveness. . . . The Master's injunction is, that we pray in secret and let our lives attest our sincerity."
