Full and complete lists of each and all materials required are on file in the office of the City Clerk of the City of Torrance and are designated as Section I material for the City of Torrance Water Department, according to Specifications No. W-12-1941, and said Section 1 on file is hereby referred to and by this reference incorporated herein and made a part hereof. Copies of said Section No. 1 may be obtained free by interested persons upon application to the office of the City Clerk, in the City Hall of the City of Torrance, in said City.

The quantity shown in said Section 1 is an estimate only and the City reserves the right to purchase more or less (within reasonable limits) pipe than the amount specified in said Section 1 at the unit bid price.

The said pipe above referred to must be furnished in accordance with and must conform to the requirements of "Specifications No. W-12-1941, Torrance, California" for pipe, heretofore approved by the City Council of said City, now on file in the office of the City Clerk of said City, open to public inspection, hereby referred to and by this reference incorporated herein and made a part hereof. Copies of said Specifications may be obtained free on application to the City Clerk at his office.

Each bid must be accompanied by a certified or cashier's check, or bidder's bond, or cash deposit, in the sum of at least 10% of the amount bid and payable to the City of Torrance, California. The check, bond or deposit of the successful bidder shall be forfeited to said City in the event that such bidder, after being awarded the contract, fails to either furnish the materials bid upon or enter into the required contract and furnish the necessary bond for faithful performance in the sum of 25% of the total contract price, within ten days after written notice of award, or within such extension of said period as the City Council may grant.

High Death Toll Taken Yearly By Heart Ailments

HEART disease is America's number one death dealer. Every year it claims 360,000 victims in this country alone, and unlike cancer and tuberculosis, the death rate is increasing every year.
