
Monson is employed at National Supply Company here. Mr. and Mrs. Monson will make their home at Redondo Beach.

Memory of America's war dead in the first World War will be honored here tomorrow (Friday) when everyone will be asked to wear a memorial poppy in tribute to their service and sacrifice.

Plans for the observance of Poppy Day are being completed by Bert S. Crossland Unit of the local American Legion Auxiliary under the leadership of Mrs. Velora Murphy, Poppy Day chairman. The memorial flowers, made by disabled war veterans, will be offered on the streets throughout the day by the Auxiliary women and volunteer workers.

"This year, with the threatening shadow of a new World War falling across America, the memorial poppy has new significance," Mrs. Murphy said. "It shows that America still remembers and honors those who fell in its defense twenty-three years ago; that Americans still believe that America's free way of life is worth any sacrifice, and that the spirit of patriotism still burns strongly in American hearts."
